1905 Photograph of Lockington School



This photograph was on a postcard discovered by Debbie and Andrew Tyzack, to whom many thanks. Late of this village they now live in Winteringham, Lincolnshire.

It was taken outside 21 Back Street (now Chapel Street). Note that the stamp is hand franked "Lockington" and was probably done in the Post Master's house at the time, now "Stamford House", on Front Street.

The bowler-hatted gentleman is William James Algar who



was aged 43 in 1905. He was Headmaster of the school from 1900 to 1922, and appears in several roles on the Parish Council for many years and is buried in our churchyard. 90/92 Front Street was built especially for him and was originally one house but split into two after his death in 1937. If memory serves, he also played the church organ.

Adjacent to his grave (photo right) is a small memorial to Norman Algar, a watchmaker's apprentice in Hull. He was killed on the Somme on 16th November 1916 aged 24 and is listed as Private 3363, 1st/4th Battalion of the East Yorkshire Regiment. He is buried at the





Dernacourt Communal Cemetery in France along with 1996 other casualties. His is the first name on the Great War memorial bronze plaque in our church and was William and his wife Jemima's son. He would have been aged 13 at the time of the photograph and probably appears on it somewhere.

By coincidence your scribe once lived in 21 Back Street and Debbie and Andrew occupied 92 Front Street for several years.

The Dog Poo Problem!

The Lockington Parish Council has become increasingly concerned about the increasing reports of dogs being allowed to run free on specific fields, with dog poo consequently not being collected or the bags containing it being left for others to clear up.

Dog walking is a key form of enjoyment for many residents of the village and its visitors. We would therefore ask all residents, but especially those in the dog walking community, to help raise awareness of the following:

- Many of the paths around the village cross fields used by local farmers to graze animals, whether or not the fields contain animals at the time.
- Dog poo contains pathogens harmful to livestock. This is passed on when livestock eat grass contaminated by excrement, requiring expensive treatment later.

In the interest of all stakeholders in the village, residents, farmers and visitors, please ensure that:

- DOGS ARE TO BE KEPT UNDER CLOSE CONTROL AT ALL TIMES
- DOGS AND OWNERS KEEP TO THE PATHS DEFINED BY THE RIGHTS OF WAY.
- CARE IS TAKEN TO ENSURE ALL POO IS COLLECTED, BAGGED AND REMOVED.

All residents and visitors, with or without dogs, are asked to observe the Countryside Code and enjoy their walk.

CPR and Defibrillator Familiarisation Event 17 July 2025 @ 1930 hrs in the Village Hall

A resident of Lockington, Jonathan Stanley, has approached the Parish Council, kindly offering his time and expertise to familiarise residents with CPR and the use of the Defibrillator.

Jon is a volunteer Community First Responder for Yorkshire Ambulance Service. The Parish Council is very grateful for this offer and feels this is an essential opportunity for the village to get involved with potentially life-saving familiarisation.

Knowing how to carry out effective cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, or CPR, is a genuine skill to have if you are ever faced with someone who has suffered a cardiac arrest. In addition, being aware of how the village defibrillator works and what to expect if you are asked to use it may help save a life.

Many residents have never had the opportunity to learn how to perform effective CPR or have not practised it recently. Similarly, very few people have been shown how to use an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), such as the one located in Lockington's repurposed telephone box on Front Street. Consequently, it is not uncommon for individuals to feel anxious or even afraid at the prospect of being asked to perform CPR or use an AED in an emergency.

Considering this, the Parish Council has organised a free summer event for parish residents to familiarise themselves with CPR and AED usage. Everyone is welcome to attend this event, which will feature explanations and demonstrations of effective CPR techniques and how to use an AED. Residents will then have the chance to practise CPR on a mannequin and operate an AED, all under the supervision of a Community First Responder from the ambulance service. Additionally, advice will be offered on recognising symptoms of stroke and managing choking.

This free familiarisation event will occur on Thursday, July 17, at 7:30 pm in Lockington Village Hall. Please note that there will be no formal qualifications or certification; instead, the event is intended to build confidence in learning and using lifesaving skills in a relaxed, informal and (hopefully!) enjoyable setting. See you there!
